# SCIENCE WEEK IN WELLESBOURNE

'This week, the whole school have been enjoying Science activities. EYFS had a special visit from a dinosaur, they produced some beautiful writing all about what dinosaurs look like, what they eat and how strong they are. KS1 took part in workshops with 'Silly Science', watching a spectacular display of experiments. KS2 took part in workshops with 'Forensic Science', the children loved taking on the role of a forensic scientists, using scientific evidence to solve crimes. Children have also been very busy in their classrooms, carrying out exciting enguiries.



**Reception** had a visit from The Silly Scientist, she talked to the children about forces and chemical reactions as she showed them lots of experiments. The children got to join in with lots of the experiments, they had so much fun as we heard them roaring with laughter many times (especially when she got out her leaf blower!).



**Year 1** did a 'Mystery Box' experiment. Children put their hands in the box to explore the sense of touch and had to try and identify the objects without seeing them. Objects included dice, fruit and even jelly.

**Year 2** really enjoyed attending the Silly Science workshop as part of Science Week. They carried out the Exploding Lemonade experiment and looked at how a 'chemical reaction' and a 'build-up of pressure' can create an explosion.

# HISTORY CORNER

Charles I was the King of Great Britain and Ireland between 1625 and 1649. He was a devout Anglican (member of the Church of England) and helped the poor and needy. He believed that Kings should be able to rule as they pleased without being told what to do by anyone else. This attitude annoyed British nobles, so they turned against him, leading to Civil War (war within our own country). He dissolved Parliament three times between 1625 and 1629 and rules without a government, deciding to rule the country by himself. This forced him to raise revenue (money or funding) by non-parliamentary means, which made him increasingly unpopular because it involved raising taxes for people.

### IN NURSERY THIS WEEK

This week in Nursery we have been enjoying Science week. We have been reading Goldilocks and the Three Bears so we did an experiment to find out 'What makes a comfy bed?'. We asked the children what they thought makes a 'good' and a 'bad' bed. For a 'good' bed the children said it should be comfortable, soft and warm and a 'bad' bed would be hard, bumpy and cold. We discussed what materials we might need such as pillows, blankets and a quilt. Then using a selection of various materials we began to experiment which would make a comfy bed. The children used their senses to explore the materials and lav down and put their head on them to test them out. Some materials were soft, thick and fluffy and the children said they would like to sleep on them but other materials were thin and had holes in so wouldn't be a good idea as they wouldn't keep the children warm.

On Wednesday we had very exciting visitors visit our Nursery. Bella and Sophie the dinosaurs came to say hello. The children were amazed by the dinosaurs and enjoyed stroking them. They were a bit shocked when the dinosaurs roared but luckily they were very gentle and enjoyed being stroked.



## IN RECEPTION THIS WEEK

What a busy and exciting week we have had in Reception this week! We have been celebrating British Science week. We began by learning about Scientists and the different things that they might do. We were set a challenge- to build a tall building that would be strong and stable. The children had to use what they had learnt from the Scientists to construct their buildings. They thought about balance, the forces on their buildings, and the materials that they used. We had a visit from The Silly Scientist, she talked to the children about forces and chemical reactions as she showed them lots of experiments. The children got to join in with lots of the experiments, they had so much fun as we heard them roaring with laughter many times (especially when she got out her leaf blower!).
