This week Ms Mallon has given us an insight into growing up in Liverpool in the 60's

Growing Up in Liverpool in the 60's!

Growing up in Liverpool in the 60's was the most exciting place and time to be!

Things were very different when I was growing up than what they are today. My family lived in a little terraced house. This meant the houses were all joined together and we had no gardens, front or back. Our back yard was separated from our neighbours by a tall wall. My mum used to shout over the wall and talk to our neighbour – who just happened to be her sister – my Aunty Shirley!

As kids we would play in the street. Very few houses had cars so we could play out quite safely, which we did from morning until we were called in for tea. All the houses would have their doors open and if one of us kids got hurt, an adult would pop out of the nearest door and sort it out.

Sometimes a house would have a party. Us kids were relegated to the kitchen where we would listen to the music and practice our dancing – my favourite was 'The Twist', to the Beatles Twist and Shout, which I felt I got very good at!! I was 6 years old!

We didn't have a TV in my house, or a computer or a telephone and mobile phones didn't exist. We had a record player and a radio and we would listen to the chart show, on the radio, every Sunday at tea time. Every couple of weeks, a van would come around the streets selling groceries and bottles of pop (lemonade); my favourite was Cream Soda and I hated Dandelion and Burdock. My brother and I would argue over which flavor we wanted!

In my memory, these days were filled with music and sunshine. The fame and popularity of the Beatles grew. Everybody had a favourite Beatle (mine was Paul McCartney) and Liverpool was talked about all over the world. I was proud to be from Liverpool and I still am! Our History Ambassadors recommend ...

IN NURSERY THIS WEEK

This week in Nursery we have been reading 'Little Red Riding Hood' as part of our Traditional Tales theme. We have been talking about the characters in the story and thinking of words to describe the wolf such as mean, nasty and bad. We used the sequencing cards and the stick puppets to help retell the story and remembered what happened in the beginning, middle and end of the story.

In Maths we have been using positional language. The children had to decide where the teddy was using words such as on top, underneath, between and inside. They followed instructions of where to put the teddy. The children also had a go at putting the teddy in various places and asking their friends to say where it was. We use this language all of the time in various contexts which helps the children to remember and begin to use it more frequently in their every day lives.

We have started to talk about Easter and the celebrations that take place during this time. We discussed why we celebrate Easter and the importance of remembering Jesus and the sacrifices he made. The children are super excited to hear that the Easter Bunny will be visiting soon and are having lots of fun making Easter crafts.



IN RECEPTION THIS WEEK

Reception have really enjoyed using our outside area this week. It has been lovely to watch them and develop our learning outside. This week we decided to continue our book of Little Red, and wrote some trap instructions to catch the big bad wolf. The children had some very inventive ideas on how this would be possible. In Math's we focused on addition through number lines and the part whole model. The children are really starting to grasp these concepts. We have also begun to learn about Easter and why it is celebrated.
